## Ladies of Charity National Assembly Seeing Christ in the Faces of Those We Serve

After a two-year hiatus, nearly 100 Ladies of Charity from five regions across the country gathered in person last August in Knoxville, Tennessee for the LCUSA National Assembly. In St. Vincent's words, "the poor are helped more when we organize", ultimately the "why" of national assemblies. "Being present announces a love of Ladies of Charity; a gift of ourselves to one another mirrors a love of Christ, Sts. Vincent, Louise, and Elizabeth in a very concrete way" (July 1640).

From the meet and greet reception ("Jeans and Pearls") to a two-day agenda that included prayer, liturgy, guest speakers, table discussions, break-out sessions featuring a showcase of local projects, delicious meals, and opportunities to step out into the city, the Assembly was exceptional. Featured topics included: Widening the Frame: Expanding Perspectives on the Impact of Poverty (Father Ragan Shriver); A Vincentian Response to Homelessness in America (Charles Levesque, JD); Being St. Vincent de Paul: A Primer (Rev. Patrick J. Griffin); Who is My Neighbor: Racism and Our



Response (Sandy Figueroa). The Assembly closed with Mass at the Cathedral of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, followed by dinner and a musical gala. ## **The Clothing Center**

The Clothing Center got off to a slow start this school year, but each week we are seeing the numbers increase. As of this time we are up to clothing about 300 children. Last year we served families remotely, with the assistance of the MPS Social Work staff. This year, we were excited to resume in-person contact with families but understand it may take a bit of transition time for the changeover.

We have a committed group of Clothing Center volunteers, and we still need more, since the Center is now open two days a week, Wednesdays 11:00 am to 2:00 pm and Thursdays, 8:30 am to 11:30 am, and the second Saturday of the month, 9:00am to 12:00 pm. Periodically the Center is also open on Monday mornings to sort, label, and restock, clean, and provide training to new or returning volunteers. Clothing donations have been steady and our racks are full. After Team Rubicon provided needed items to the Afghan refugees, they contacted us to see if we needed clothing. We said YES! Little did we know that they would deliver boxes and boxes of primarily new clothing, which we stored in Father Mike's garage. (Thank you, Team Rubicon and Father Mike!) Despite an abundance of clothing, can you believe we still need items in specific sizes,

**especially jeans:** Boys in sizes 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 12, 14, 16, 18 and Girls in sizes 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 14, 16.

It is truly an honor and a gift to work at the Clothing Center. LOC members are kindhearted, efficient, and fun, and the incredible people we serve may be poor in material things but have an abundance of spirit. God Bless all of us and THANK YOU.

## **A FEW THOUGHTS**

Through our commitment and mission as Ladies of Charity, we directly witness the impact of poverty on the lives of others. Several poignant examples of this have occurred since we opened our door this year. On a very warm August day, a man stopped and asked if we had "just anything to eat." We were able to give him some bottles of water and information about meal sites, and one volunteer gave him money. All of us there were very touched by this encounter. Another morning, a young mother of three small children came into the Clothing Center as volunteers were preparing for the school year. She was living in her car and did not know what to do. Yes, we could offer her clothing and volunteers called agencies that provide housing, but to no avail. Most recently, a man came by just as we had left the Clothing Center. He was looking for blankets for his family and had been to all the



sites we suggested as resources. In each of these situations we could not "fix" the problems and felt helpless in the face of them. We carry those moments in our hearts and offer our prayers. We are thankful to be privileged to offer clothing to children in need. The words of St. Vincent de Paul come to mind. You will soon learn that charity is a heavy burden to carry—heavier than the kettle of soup and the basket of bread. But you must keep your gentleness and your smile. It is not enough to give soup and bread. This the rich can do. You are the servants of the poor... the poor are your masters—terribly sensitive and exacting, as you will see. It is because of your love and only your love that the poor will forgive you the bread you give to them. Thank you for the love you give as Ladies of Charity through your commitment and prayers.



## **Cathy Liska Reflection**

#### **Vincentian Tidbits**

In this issue, we'll encounter yet another connection to St. Vincent de Paul, Jeanne-Antide Thouret, or St. Joan Antida, as we know her in the US. Born in 18th C. France, the fifth of eight children, she became responsible for maintaining the family household due to the death of her mother. Six years later she entered the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, serving the poor, and fled to Switzerland during the French Revolution, where she cared for the sick. Upon her return to France, she established a school, dispensary, and soup kitchen for the poor. She encountered many challenges with the church hierarchy in establishing the Congregation of the Sisters of Charity France, a branch that remains vibrant and worldwide today on four continents. In 1932, the sisters came to the US to help immigrant families in Milwaukee, where they continue to operate St. Joan Antida High School to this day.
