# THE CLOTHING CENTER

What a year! The Clothing Center was on track to have the most successful year to date in terms of the number of students clothed and having racks and bins bursting with items generously donated. Volunteers were excited about the possibility of exceeding previous years' numbers and thought that the changes made to the Clothing Center schedule would help achieve our goal. For the 2023-24 school year the Clothing



Center was open two days a week (Wednesday and Thursday) from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. as well as the second Saturday of each month.

By January 10, 2024, we had clothed 757 students just 61 students less that the total number served the previous year. HURRAY! We were excited! Then the fateful news came. When the January cold spell hit Milwaukee the Clothing Center radiators malfunctioned and we were closed. Volunteers received the news from the pastor of St Francis Assisi who told us that we could not enter the Clothing Center premises until further notice. Marlene Kollmeyer, LOC President, kept in constant contact with Fr. Javier hoping that the problem would be easily remedied, and the Clothing Center would reopen its doors.

Given the uncertainty about that location, a group of LOC members met on March 26th to discuss options of staying within the St. Francis Assisi parish community where we had been happy for the last ten years or of looking elsewhere. The discussion resulted in the decision to begin to look elsewhere. Members initiated this process by:

- Writing the Capuchin Provincial General to ascertain their decision relating to the future of the Clothing Center building. (The Clothing Center building is not owned by St. Francis of Assisi Parish but by the Capuchin Province located in Michigan.)
- 2. Contacting various parishes within the Central City to see if there would be any space available to house the Clothing Center. (Approximately 2000 sq.ft. is needed to house clothing racks, processing center, storage space and adequate space for clients. The space could be a large space or several rooms in close proximity to each other, on a bus line if possible, adequate parking and relatively safe.)

Research on possible Central City sites affiliated with various parishes resulted in four possibilities, with site visits made to assess the strengths and weaknesses of each. Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish was selected and plans currently are underway to configure the leased space we will have there and to prepare for the move. Along the way, we were advised by the Capuchins that they were not going to repair the St. Francis building.



### CHRISTMAS LUNCHEON

A joyful spirit filled the air as attendees made their way home.



### LENTEN EVENING OF REFLECTION

The Milwaukee Catholic Home was buzzing with the lively voices of nearly 50 Ladies of Charity and their guests on Tuesday March 19th for our annual Evening of Reflection. A 5 pm Mass started the evening with Father Javier, Pastor of St. Francis of Assisi Parish as our celebrant. He told us on this Feast of the Solemnity of St. Joseph that St. Joseph is a beloved saint of the Capuchin order. Father's homily focused on Joseph's qualities of listening to God's voice and trusting in God's plan even in times of difficulty. Joseph serves as an example of how we can live out our faith with conviction and trust. Following Mass, we enjoyed a delicious dinner together. Then we returned to the chapel for a special one-hour presentation by Janet Peterson from the Acacia Theater Company. The presentation, "The Handmaid of the Lord", featured the story of Jesus through the eyes of his mother from the time of His conception through His death and resurrection. With minimal costumes, props and a thoughtprovoking script, Janet tool us through the significant event from Jesus' birth to adulthood. The audience was enthralled and at times tearful as the dramatic story unfolded. It was an experience that will linger for a long time in the hearts and minds of all who attended.



### LADIES OF CHARITY THE HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENT

The Vincentian Family consists of all of the Associations and Congregations whose mission is dedicated to the service of the poor and destitute as given to us by Vincent de Paul and Louise de Marillac. The following are branches of the Vincentian Family.

The Ladies of Charity -1617- St. Vincent founded the Confraternities of Charity in Chatillon, France by organizing the lay women in the parishes to honor Our Lord Jesus Christ and His holy Mother and to assist the sick and the poor in body and spirit.

-1857- the Ladies of Charity were founded in the United States at St. Vincent's Parish in St. Louis, Missouri.

The Congregation of the Mission (C.M.) -1625- St. Vincent founded his community of Priests and brothers.

-1818- the Congregation of the Mission (CM) arrived in Perryville, MO. Joseph Rosati, CM was the first Bishop of St. Louis

The Daughters of Charity (D.C.) -1633- St. Vincent de Paul and St. Louise de Marillac co-founded the Daughters of Charity.

-1828- the Sisters of Charity from Emmitsburg arrived in St. Louis and began their ministry at Mullanphy Hospital, later named DePaul Hospital.

The Sisters of Charity (S.C.) -1809- St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, using the Rule of St. Vincent, founded the Sisters of Charity at Emmitsburg, Maryland.

-1850- the Sisters of Charity in Emmitsburg joined the Daughters of Charity in France. The Sisters of Charity of several other cities and states as well as Canada formed separate Congregations.

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul -1833- Frederic Ozanam, together with his companions, founded the Society of St. Vincent de Paul.

-1845- the Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded in the United States at the Old Cathedral in St. Louis.

**Vincentian Marian Youth (VMY)** -1835- the first Children of Mary Association was organized. The purpose of this lay youth group is to form members to live a solid faith following Jesus Christ the Evangelizer of the poor.

-2004- this organization now called "Vincentian Marian Youth", was established in Perryville, MO.

The Association of the Miraculous Medal (AMM) -1847-the Association of the Miraculous Medal was formed at the Motherhouse of the Congregation of the Mission in Paris. The members of the Association wear the Miraculous Medal and they spread devotion to Mary in the model of Christian living.

-1918- the AMM was established in Perryville, MO -1927-the Central AMM began in Philadelphia, PA.

Vincentian Mission Corps (VMC) -1985- the Vincentian Service Corps was established by the Daughters of Charity in St. Louis. -2012- the Gateway Volunteers of the Vincentian Priests joined the Vincentian Service Corps, and the named changed to Vincentian Mission Corps.

The mission and common thread of the Vincentian family is to find Christ in the poor by enfolding the world in a network of charity. We are proud that Ladies of Charity is an international organization. It is the first and oldest association of the Vincentian family.

### **Vincentian Tidbits**

Vincent de Paul's Strategy in the 21st Century

St. Vincent was a transformational saint who had a profound effect not only on his generation but also generations beyond. What has been discovered about St. Vincent is the "secret sauce" for this transformation. Although it seemed like any other day, Wednesday, August 23, 1617, marked the beginning of all the transformational ministries set in motion by Vincent. On that date he called a



meeting of seven women in a small French community. He suggested and they agreed to form an association to take care of the sick by taking turns doing what needed to be done. The first Ladies of Charity (then called the Confraternity of Charity) was born. Often overlooked is that this organization was the "pioneer beginnings" of the oldest still functioning group of women in the church. (Today that's US)! Plus, it was actually the suggestion of a lay woman! Vincent lent his support and organizing genius. He realized firsthand that women were an untapped ministerial resource in the church. This was the first of many institutions he set in order that includes the Priests and Brothers of the Mission (1625) and the Daughters of Charity (1633). Today many followers of the Vincentian way continue to share a common concern and purpose to serve those who are poor. (Information gathered comes from Father John Freund, CM).
